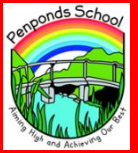





PENPONDS PRIMARY SCHOOL

SEPTEMBER PUPIL SAFEGUARDING SNAPSHOT



Each month Safeguarding Leads ask a cross section of children questions relating to safeguarding. The questions asked support us in ensuring that the school is a safe and secure place for the children to learn and develop. We feel it is important to know the views of the pupils and also identify any gaps and address them accordingly. (Article 12 UNCRC – Right to a Voice)

QUESTION	RESPONSE
If you felt unsafe or unhappy at school what would you do?	<p>Tell an adult Ask a friend</p>
If there was an emergency at school, what would you do?	<p>Tell an adult Get an adult Tell Mrs Bailey</p>
How do you keep safe when using the computer?	<p>Block a person if you do not know them or if they are being unkind. Tell an adult if you see something you don't like. Don't share personal information</p>
What does online safety mean to you? Why is it important?	<p>Being safe on the internet Delete scary games and show them to an adult People can be unkind online</p>
If a friend is worried about an issue outside of school what would you do?	<p>Tell a teacher Tell your Mum or Dad. Tell their parents. Depends what the problem is, but tell them to talk to an adult. Try and cheer them up</p>
What would you do if you were worried about a test you were about to take?	<p>Tell parents or siblings Ask an adult to help you and tell them how you are feeling Ask someone for advice who has done a test before Just have a go</p>
What does healthy living mean to you?	<p>Being fit. Eating fruit and vegetables. Having a treat occasionally Exercise regularly Join in with PE and the Daily Dash</p>

<p>What does the word respect mean to you?</p>	<p>Listening to the person talking and don't talk over them Respect others and they will respect you Keep rude thoughts to yourself</p>
<p>If you are in a disagreement what is the best way to solve it?</p>	<p>Talk about it and try to forgive them Try to cheer them up Ask an adult for help Walk away and get help Ask a friend to help</p>
<p>What does the word tolerance mean to you?</p>	<p>Accepting things and putting up with things Not sure</p>
<p>How do you know that you are doing the right things at school?</p>	<p>Nice things being said to you Not getting told off Teachers smiling Following the rules and listening</p>
<p>Can you name any of the rights you have as children?</p>	<p>Relax and play Right to a voice Be healthy Right to an education</p>
